




Bunratty Chess Festival

This tournament took place in Ireland last weekend with about 300 players competing in 4 different sections. The Irish chess public was delighted to see in action world's No. 5 player – GM Peter Svidler (2763). He has become the highest rated player to compete in Ireland, though Michael Adams, who played in Kilkenny and Dublin, is a close second. There were several strong players from the UK and Iceland in the Masters section, so the fighting was pretty tense. I was happy with my own performance – in the last round I won a nice game against GM Gawain Jones, which I plan to show in the next *Chess Today* issue.



This tournament started in Lublin yesterday. IM Szoen (2491) and GM Gajewski (2594) took an early lead after beating IM Moranda (2533) and GM Macieja (2617) respectively. The latter game ended in a curious zugzwang:

Annotated Game


White: GM Peter Svidler (2763) Black: GM Simon Williams (2482) Bunratty Masters (3), 23.02.2008 The Dutch Defence – [A90]

1.d4 Svidler usually plays 1.e4, but against 1.d4 Simon Williams plays mostly the Dutch, which explains Svidler's choice of the first move – the Dutch remains a risky opening.

1...e6 2.c4 f5 3.g3 幻fổ 4.真g2 真b4+ 5.幻d2

In case of the more popular 5.4d2Black can consider 5...4e7 – then the white bishop is somewhat misplaced on d2.

5....a5 6.公gf3 b6 (D)




Black is playing a hybrid of the Dutch and the Bogo-Indian.

7.a3 Qe7

Perhaps it was better to part with the bishop – after 7... ڲxd2+. After 8. ₩xd2 ڲb7 Black is doing OK. This position resembles some lines of the Nimzo– Indian with 4. ₩c2. Therefore White should consider 8. 2xd2!? Ξa7 9.e4 ڲb7 10.f3 or 10.d5 exd5 11.exd5 ₩e7+ 12. ₩e2 ₩xe2+ 13. ₩xe2.

8.②e5 莒a7 9.e4 鼻b7 10.d5 fxe4?! It was safer to play 10...0–0. 11.②xe4 exd5 12.③xf6+ 鼻xf6 (D)




13.0-0! d4?!

Black was already in serious trouble and his move does not help. 13...Qxe5? 14.@h5+ is very bad for Black. 13...0-0? 14.Qxd5+ @h8 15.Qf7+ \xetaxf7 16.Qxf7 leaves Black an exchange down. Perhaps the lesser evil was 13...Qc6.

14.鼻xb7 莒xb7 15.營h5+!

Svidler goes for the kill. Computer also gives a curious line 15.≜g5!? 0–0 16.\#xd4.


15...g6 16.公xg6 hxg6 17.營xg6+ 皆8 18.罝e1 (D)



The black king has been stripped of its pawn shield and cannot withstand the forthcoming assault. White plans to get the bishop to f4 (or h6, if needed) and double rooks on the e-file.

18...d5


Black is also doomed after 18...⊉c6 19.≜h6+ \arrow xh6+ \arrow g7 21.\arrow h5. 19.\arrow f4 (D)



1-0.


Black is completely lost, for example: 20... \Bar{b}8 21. \Bar{B}ae1 dxc4 22. \Bar{A}xc7!.
